



CHAPTER I What Is a Volcano?

What do we know about the earth?

This is the earth. The earth has three layers.

People live on the top layer. We call this layer the crust.

Look at the picture. Touch numeral 2. Read what the label says


Under the crust is a layer of hard rock. This is the middle layer.

Look at the picture. Touch numeral 3. Read what the label says

Under the middle layer is hot rock. The inner part is so hot that the rocks are melted. Scientists call the inner part of the earth the earth's core.

How does a volcano develop?

The hot rock stays under the earth's crust. If the crust cracks, the hot melted rock may spill onto the land. Then it is called lava. When lava spills from the earth, we say that a volcano has erupted.



What do we call hot melted rock that spills onto the land? What happens when a volcano erupts? What facts did we learn about volcanoes in this chapter?

A volcano is the hill or mountain formed by the lava. Some volcanoes erupt violently with hot rock and lava spewing into the air. Other volcanoes erupt with lava flowing gently from the earth in thick rivers of hot melted rock. There are hundreds of active volcanoes in the world today.

What is this chaper about? So, what is the topic of this chapter?





What was Pele's problem? What would she do when she got mad? What is hot melted rock called?



What happened next?




Rivers of ash and hot mud ran from the volcano. Plants, animals, and even people were killed. When the volcano stopped, all that could be seen was ash and mud across the land.

CHAPTER I

What Is an Earthquake?

What causes an earthquake?

This is the earth. Remember, the earth has three layers. The top layer of the earth is called the crust. The earth's crust is very deep.



See the picture. Deep under the earth's surface, the crust is made up of big pieces of hard rock called plates. The plates are outlined in red.

Trace the plates with your fingers.

When the plates move, they sometimes bump and scrape against each other. The land vibrates and shakes as the plates bump and scrape.

When this happens, we feel an earthquake.

What happens when the plates bump and scrape against each other?



What happens in an earthquake?

Earthquakes can be big and they can be small. A small earthquake is quick. If an earthquake is small, you may ask, "What was that bump? Did you feel that?"



Though a small earthquake may feel like a quick little jiggle, a big earthquake can be very violent and scary. Luckily, big earthquakes don't happen very often.

In a big earthquake, you may hear a rumble. The ground will vibrate and shake. If you are in a big earthquake, it is important to drop, get under cover, and hold on.




What should you do during an earthquake?


The Legend of Queen Nell
